By the Numbers: UNDERSTANDING THE IMPACT OF NEW YORK CHILD WELFARE ON FAMILIES

New York has been successful in reducing family separation and the foster care census. But CPS overreach continues, subjecting thousands of falsely accused families to invasive, lengthy and harmful investigations each year.

Over the past 20 years, foster care admissions in New York have decreased by 60%; however, CPS investigations have declined by only 6% during this period.



Mandated reporter requirements encourage overreporting to the SCR because workers fear failure-to-act consequences, such as professional suspension and criminal liability. This widespread reporting triggers family policing practices that infringe on parental rights and disproportionately affect communities of color.

This policing response to poverty is not only incredibly harmful to families, it also wastes valuable taxpayer dollars to punish rather than strengthen families.

- **85% of investigations are due to accusations of "neglect"** which often conflate poverty & race with perceived child maltreatment.
- **76% of investigations were deemed unfounded** due to a lack of evidence to substantiate the claims of maltreatment.
- NYS spends an estimated **\$348 million annually** on these investigations of innocent, low-income families.

Imagine the good we could do by reallocating this money to provide families with what they say they need to thrive. Families are clamoring for direct cash supports, childcare, and safe, affordable housing, among other concrete material needs.

THERE IS A GROWING CONSENSUS:

It's time to reexamine and reimagine our approach to child and family wellbeing.

With legislative champions, we can stop punitive policies and redirect public funds to expand community-driven supports that keep New York families intact and ensure that the small percentage of children at risk of physical harm remain safe and supported.
